Diocese of La Crosse Guidelines for Reporting Instances of Child Abuse: The Diocese of La Crosse, through its policies and procedures, seeks to provide a prompt, appropriate and compassionate response to reporters of sexual abuse of a child by a priest or deacon. Anyone wishing to make a report of an allegation of sexual abuse should send that report to Bishop William P. Callahan at the Diocese of La Crosse, P.O. Box 4004, La Crosse, WI 54602-4004. The form is available through the Diocese of La Crosse, Office for Clergy; or on the diocesan website at: dioceseoflacrosse.com. **Individuals are also encouraged to take their reports directly to civil authorities.** Copies of the diocesan policy are available through your local parish and on the diocesan website. 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Today is the Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed or, as it is more commonly called, All Souls Day. Indeed, the entire month of November is dedicated to praying for those who at their death were not yet ready to be ushered into the presence of Love Himself. “All who die in God’s grace and friendship, but still imperfectly purified, are indeed assured of their eternal salvation; but after death they undergo purification, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of Heaven . . . The Church gives the name Purgatory to this final purification of the elect, which is entirely different from the punishment of the damned” (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, 1030-1031). Remember to pray for all our beloved dead, that God “forgive whatever sins they may have committed through human weakness and . . . grant them everlasting peace” (*Order of Christian Funerals*, 175). May they rest in peace.

We continue with part six of the answer to the question posed by a parishioner: “**Who is a person to call if somebody needs the last rites before death if the Pastor is gone?** Last week we noted that although it is laudable to celebrate the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick during Mass, it is most commonly administered outside of Mass at the home of the sick person or in a healthcare facility. In order to more clearly manifest the Church who accompanies the sick, it is desirable that family and friends of the sick person actively participate in the celebration of the sacrament. How is the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick celebrated in such circumstances? After the **Sign of the Cross and Greeting** similar to that which begins the Mass, the Priest sprinkles **Holy Water** on the sick person saying: “Let this water call to mind our Baptism into Christ, who by His Death and Resurrection has redeemed us.” **In order to be properly disposed for this sacrament, it “should, if possible, be preceded by individual Confession on the part of the sick person”** (*Compendium of the Catechism of the Catholic Church*, 318). Any family or friends present are asked to leave the room until the sick person has completed his or her Confession with the Priest. Additionally, if death is imminent, the Priest may give the person the **Apostolic Blessing or Pardon**. Having just received **forgiveness of their sins** through the Sacrament of Penance, the dying person is in the state of grace and so disposed to receive this blessing by which **all temporal punishment due to sin is remitted**. In other words, through the Apostolic Pardon the dying person gains the complete pardon of all temporal punishment (or purgation) due for those sins that have already been sacramentally forgiven by the reception of absolution and the doing of the penance. Having repented of sin, family and friends return as all listen to the proclamation of one of the Gospel passages about Jesus’ ministry of physical and spiritual healing. Indeed, “word and sacrament form an indivisible whole. The **Liturgy of the Word** . . . awakens the faith of the sick person and of the community to ask the Lord for the strength of His Spirit” (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, 1518).

The celebration of the sacrament proper follows. First “the ‘Priests of the Church’ (James 5:14) – in silence – **lay hands on the sick; they pray over them in the faith of the Church**” (*Catechism of the Catholic Church* 1519). This is the **epiclesis** or prayer asking for the sanctifying power of God’s Holy Spirit proper to this sacrament (see *Catechism of the Catholic Church*, 1519). The Priest then leads the faithful in a **prayer of thanksgiving** over the blessed oil that will be used to anoint the sick person. This oil – called the **Oil of the Infirm or Oil of the Sick** – is blessed by the Bishop at the Chrism Mass at the Cathedral during Holy Week and then distributed to each parish for use locally. In case of urgency when no Oil of the Infirm is available, the Priest himself may bless oil for this sacramental use. With his thumb the Priest first **anoints the forehead** of the person saying: “**Through this holy anointing may the Lord in His love and mercy help you with the grace of the Holy Spirit.**” Then he **anoints the palms of each hand** of the sick person saying: “**May the Lord who frees you from sin save you and raise you up.**” It is interesting to note that when the sick person is a Priest, it is the *top* of his hands that are anointed, not the palms. The reason for this is that the palms of his hands have already been anointed with the oil of the Sacred Chrism during his Ordination to the Holy Priesthood. Following the anointing the Priest offers a **prayer** appropriate to the circumstances of the sick person. All pray together the **Lord’s Prayer**. If the sick person is able, he or she receives **Holy Communion** along with anyone else who is properly disposed. Just like at Mass, the **Prayer after Communion** follows and a **Final Blessing** concludes this sacramental encounter with Jesus Christ. Next week we will explore the grace that this sacrament confers upon the sick.
